

Lynn Kratcha Memorial Rural Bursary 2021 Description of Tasks for Applicants

Applications are now called for the Lynn Kratcha Memorial Rural Bursary. Eligible students are those currently in year 2 of the MBBS programme.

The bursary consists of a four-week rural placement, site TBA. The bursary will include support for travel and accommodation, and can be undertaken as the 4-week, Year 2 rural placement.

If funding allows there may be more than one international bursary awarded under these rules. Winners must be prepared to provide an oral and written report on their return.

There are three components to the bursary, each of which contributes to the final mark:

- a written task – Movie review
- an interview
- an oral presentation

The written task will be used to determine a small number of "finalists", who will be invited to proceed to the next two stages.

Stage 1 – the written task

The editor of a medical students' journal has asked for a review of the Movie "MABO". The movie is a portrayal of one of Australia's national heroes: Eddie Koiki Mabo, the Torres Strait Islander who left school at age 15, yet spearheaded the High Court challenge that overthrew the fiction of terra nullius. The editor has requested the following review:

With reference to the movie "MABO":

- Give a brief description of the movie.
- Describe the issues for the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander population in the past (e.g. Land Rights, Native Title, Assimilation and Segregation Policies,) and **compare** these to current issues in the 2000's.
- The review should reflect **your views** about the movie and its relevance to the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander society/community.
- Students will be judged on presentation, clarity and coherence of arguments, originality, writing style and its suitability for the Movie review genre.
- Include referencing to support your statements where required.

Word Limit: **1000 words**

Written application is due by **12 Noon on Monday, 26th July 2021**

Written application must be submitted to the following areas:

Stage 2 – the interview and oral presentation

Successful "finalists" will be invited to go onto Stage 2 of the process, which will be held in August 2021. The dates for interviews and the presentation evening are to be advised.

Interview:

The interview will last for approximately 10 minutes. It will be conducted by an interview panel of at least three members, including a previous recipient of the bursary.

Students will be judged on communication skills, interview preparedness, motivation for entering and suitability as a representative of the College of Medicine and Dentistry.

Oral Presentation:

Students will be asked to prepare a 5-7 minute oral presentation to be delivered at the Lynn Kratcha Memorial Rural Bursary presentation night at the College. This presentation should be designed as a talk that could be delivered to a community group in North Dakota, USA about an aspect of rural health in Australia. Each student will have up to 2 minutes to answer questions from the audience.

Students will be judged on the appropriateness of the talk for a North American audience and quality of content and delivery. Students may support their talk with the usual range of AV materials.

The marking panel will consist of staff members from Medicine, previous Lynn Kratcha Memorial Rural Bursary winner/s and invited guests.
