

Between Cairns and Townsville lies the ruggedly beautiful Hinchinbrook Island National Park. Just west of Cairns lies the agriculturally rich Atherton Tablelands and to the northwest is the Gulf Savannah region with its fringing mountain ranges and wide-open spaces. Cape York Peninsula occupies Queensland's most northern corner and has enormous environmental diversity of great interest to scientists and visitors alike. Further north are the beautiful Torres Strait Islands, which have a unique history and fascinating Indigenous culture.

The 100 million-year-old UNESCO World Heritage listed Wet Tropics Rainforest is right on the doorstep of Cairns.



JCU Cairns



The modern campus is surrounded by rainforest-covered mountains and close to the northern beaches.

The campus location is spectacular – surrounded on three sides by rainforest-covered mountains. Located near the northern beaches in the suburb of Smithfield, the campus is 15 kilometres (9 miles) north of the city centre. Study facilities can also be accessed at the JCU Cairns City Campus.





Known as the 'Capital of the North', Townsville is a thriving coastal port city and the largest city in northern Australia. The region has a strong and diverse economic base including mining, mineral processing, agriculture, manufacturing, tourism and healthcare, government and defence.

Townsville is home to the Museum of Tropical Queensland and the Townsville Cultural Festival. Sport lovers can enjoy a range of events in Townsville's new 25,000 seat multi-purpose stadium.

Vibrant lifestyle

'The Strand', a 2.2km beachfront promenade is located in the heart of Townsville. Along this palm tree lined stretch are bike and walkway paths, safe swimming beaches, picturesque picnic spots, playgrounds, exercise stations, a water park and restaurants and bars with water views. Townsville offers an eclectic mix of cafes, restaurants, boutiques and bars, as well as fresh food markets.

Outdoor adventures

There are many stunning beaches within a short journey from the JCU campus. Student's can explore the kaleidoscopic colours of the Great Barrier Reef or jump on a ferry and visit nearby Magnetic Island.

Castle Hill - a giant pink granite monolith - stands proud in the centre of Townsville and offers walking tracks which are frequented by more than 2,500 locals a day! The 360-degree views of Townsville at the top are worth the journey.







Leading Hub for Marine Research

Townsville is renowned for marine research and is home of the headquarters of major marine research and management authorities including the Great Barrier Reef Marine Park Authority, the Australian Institute of Marine Science, and the Australian Bureau of Meteorology.

The city is home to the world's largest living coral reef aquarium at Reef HQ Great Barrier Reef Aquarium - which boasts a 2.5 million litre exhibition, and a rehabilitation centre for sea turtles.

JCU Townsville

JCU Townsville is set in a 386-hectare bush and parkland setting, approximately a 20-minute drive or 45-minute bus ride from the city centre. Study facilities can also be accessed at the JCU Townsville City Campus.

JCU Townsville

The campus is located in the Townsville Tropical Intelligence and Health Precinct in the suburb of Douglas, and set in a 386-hectare natural bush and parkland setting 13 kilometres (8 miles) from Townsville city centre.

Getting around

JCU Townsville is a 20-minute drive or 45-minute bus trip from the city. Buses frequently run to and from the campus.

You can even buy a second-hand bike, available from the JCU bicycle store. Study facilities can also be accessed at the JCU Townsville City Campus.

JCU Townsville houses teaching and research facilities, the main JCU library, cafés, bar, fitness and sporting facilities, a Multifaith Chaplaincy Centre. Around 1,200 students live on campus in colleges and halls of residence, giving the campus a true community atmosphere.







JCU conducts nationally significant and internationally recognised research in areas such as marine sciences, biodiversity, tropical ecology and environments, global warming, tourism, and tropical medicine, and public health care in under-served populations. We offer research and doctoral programs across diverse discipline areas.

Excellence in Research for Australia rated 83% of JCU's research fields as world-class or above. JCU received the highest possible rating, well above world standard, in the research areas of ecological applications, ecology, environmental science and management, fisheries sciences, geology, medical microbiology, organic chemistry, and plant biology. 

Information for Education Agents

We establish partnerships with education agents who share our vision of delivering quality service, experience, and education to students.

This Agent Information Kit provides advice on how to comply with relevant policy and legislative requirements and provides information on how to accurately represent JCU. Agents are also encouraged to expand their knowledge by using resources available from JCU and the Australian Government and to refer to their Agency Agreement with JCU for detailed information on their contractual obligations and requirements.

ESOS Act and National Code

As an official representative of JCU you must comply with the *Education Services for Overseas Students (ESOS) Act 2000* and *National Code of Practice for Providers of Education and Training to Overseas Students 2018*. You must be familiar with the policy environment in which Australian higher education operates. Some useful links are provided below.

The ESOS Act sets minimum standards with which we as an education provider must comply when providing education services to international students, including tuition and financial protections for students. The ESOS Act also requires that in order to deliver courses to international students, we must be registered on the Commonwealth Register of Institutions and Courses for Overseas Students (CRICOS).

The details of the minimum standards are contained in the National Code 2018, which covers all aspects of marketing, recruitment, teaching, and supporting international students.

Our agreement with you sets out in detail our expectations of our agents, including as required under the ESOS Act and the National Code 2018. In particular, you must act honestly and in good faith, and ensure that the information you provide to students in relation to our courses is accurate and up to date. You must also take reasonable steps to avoid any conflicts of interest. Your JCU representative will provide training on the ESOS Act and National Code as part of your onboarding with JCU.

Simplified Student Visa Framework (SSVF)

Under the Simplified Student Visa Framework (SSVF), the evidentiary requirements for students will be determined having regard to the student's citizenship and the institution to which the student is applying. Some students proposing to study at JCU will be required to provide evidence of English competency and financial capacity.

Agents and students can check the evidentiary requirements for JCU by using an online tool which is available on the Department of Home Affairs [website](#).

Students from most countries will simply need to provide their Confirmation of Enrolment and Overseas Student Health Cover policy number and details. However, students from certain countries will be required to provide evidence of financial capacity and proof of their English ability.

All student visa applicants must satisfy the Genuine Temporary Entrant requirements and must have the financial support required for the duration of their proposed course. They must also satisfy the other visa application criteria set by the [Department of Home Affairs](#), such as health and character requirements.

US Federal Student Aid

JCU is an active participant in the US Federal Student Aid program and must comply with strict rules in relation to student recruitment and the payment of commissions. The US government prohibits the payment of incentive-based commissions for the recruitment of US citizens into Federal Aid eligible programs. For this reason, JCU cannot pay commission to agents for the recruitment of any US citizen, regardless of their location at the time of application. Inquiries from US citizens should be referred directly to JCU at financialaid@jcu.edu.au

Agent Evaluation Process

We conduct evaluations annually with our agents that are required for the purpose of monitoring the performance of the agent, and to allow for feedback.

We will work with you to assess conversion rates, compliance with contractual requirements, and other performance indicators. Where possible, a JCU representative will visit your offices to assess the quality of counseling information delivered to students, office space, knowledge, and compliance with Australian legislative requirements.

We will assist you to perform effectively by delivering information relevant to the delivery of services through office visits and regular communication. Our staff may conduct:

- Training with teams who are new to representing the University
- Product briefings with teams who are familiar with the University
- Meetings with counsellors and managers to address any questions or information needs.

Invoice and payment terms

Recruitment fees are only paid:

1. Once JCU has received the student's full tuition fee payment for the relevant study period, and;
2. After the relevant study period census date (cut-off date for withdrawal without financial/academic penalty) has passed. The census date is usually four weeks after the published start dates for the main study periods.

Generally, agents must send a separate invoice each study period, that is twice a year for semester programs or three times a year for trimester programs. This is based on the student enrolling in a standard full time study load of 24 credits per year. If the student under-enrols or takes a leave of absence in their first year of study, agents may be required to delay invoicing until the student reaches the required study load upon which commission is based.

The agent must submit a correct invoice in accordance with the agreement with JCU. Your agency's commission rate is included in your agreement. Invoices must be sent within 12 months of the student commencing study.

To ensure prompt payment is made, representatives who are submitting their first invoice for payment by JCU should complete the JCU New Creditor Account Details (International). This form is also required whenever bank account details change. The bank account details stated on the invoice must match the bank account details in the JCU creditor system. Please contact us for a copy of this form.

JCU international application process

We endeavour to process applications as efficiently as possible. Submitting applications correctly with all relevant documentation will ensure your students receive a fast response from our team.

Please ensure the material submitted satisfies the application requirements and that the applicant is genuinely intending to come to Australia for the primary purpose of studying. JCU uses the StudyLink system for international applications; if you require training on how to use StudyLink or have trouble accessing the portal please email support@studylink.com

SUBMITTING AN APPLICATION

1. Applications via agents must be submitted via the [StudyLink system](#)
2. We will assess the application based on academic and English entry requirements and we will advise you if any additional documentation is required
3. If the application is successful, you will receive either a conditional or unconditional offer via email – this will include information on how to accept the offer. If the student is eligible for a Stipend/ Scholarship at the time of offer issuing this will also be sent with the offer.

ENTRY REQUIREMENTS

Prior to commencing studies at JCU, students will be required to fulfill academic and English language requirements and any additional requirements specific to the course. Entry requirements are available on the relevant course page on the JCU website or in the annually published JCU International Study Guide which is available to order via Ascent One (further details are provided on page 20 of this guide).

CREDIT FOR PREVIOUS STUDIES

If an applicant has completed subjects at another institution, or as part of a different degree at JCU, they may be able to transfer credit to their new course. Further information is available via our [website](#).

APPLICATION CLOSING DATES

We recommend you apply for undergraduate and postgraduate courses as early as possible. Please note, many courses have specific application due dates, so please [check the website](#) for the most up-to-date information on application dates.

Simplified Student Visa Framework (SSVF) and the admissions process

JCU expects that its agents will undertake assessments of prospective students to determine whether they meet the genuine temporary entrant (GTE) criteria for an Australian student visa and that the student will have sufficient financial capacity to meet their costs of studying and living in Australia. Further information about the GTE criteria can be found on the Home Affairs website.

Agents in some markets will be required to sign an Agent Declaration confirming that they have undertaken a GTE assessment of the student, and that, in the agent's opinion, the student does meet the GTE criteria. The Declaration must be uploaded into Studylink as part of the student's application. Your JCU Relationship Manager will advise you whether you are required to sign the Declaration and provide you with relevant training.

The University regularly reviews its visa refusals and will provide feedback to Agents where appropriate. In the event of an unacceptably high rate of refusals from an Agent, the University may terminate the agency agreement.
