Research opportunity - Include your questions in the annual National Social Survey

Central Queensland University's Population Research Laboratory is pleased to advise that we are taking researcher submissions for the 2017 National Social Survey (NSS).

This is an opportunity to obtain national population data derived from questions designed by YOU (with assistance from the PRL), in order to meet your specific research needs. These tailored questions are included in our final survey for a fee (minimum of 5 questions for \$9,750). The resultant data set contains 1,200+ cases with your variables and over 30 demographic and core variables.

The NSS utilises a cost-shared omnibus survey model, which affords researchers the opportunity to collect high quality data from a sizeable national sample at a far lower cost than an independent survey. The NSS gathers information from a random sample (n=1200) of the Australian adult population using the Computer-Assisted-Telephone-Interview (CATI) technology resident in the PRL, incorporating dual-frame random digit-dialling (landline and mobile telephone).

We welcome researchers to submit their questions for inclusion in the National Survey. We have extended the closing date for expressions of interest in NSS participation until Friday 16 June, 2017

Written cost estimates are provided upon receipt of draft questions. Questions do not need to be in their final form at the point of inquiry as we can provide advice on how to best design and formulate.

Note: A six page limit (in total) applies for items 6-10.

Note: Budgets should NOT include overheads, conference travel or consultants' fees.

Key Criteria

- Relevance to understanding the ecology of stingers
- Relevance to the identification of stingers in the field and/or during diagnosis of patients
- Relevance to the diagnosis of jellyfish syndromes and the treatment of patients
- Relevance to north Queensland and Torres Strait waters

Conditions of Award:

- a) Grants awarded are for 1 year.
- b) Applicants may be required to present their research outcomes at a meeting of the Australian Lions Foundation and should be prepared to speak at Lions Club meetings as and when requested.
- c) Applicants will be required to submit a 1 page article to appear in the Lions newsletter upon award of the grant.
- d) A final report on the project and financial acquittal of funds must be submitted to Lorna Hempstead (lorna.hempstead@jcu.edu.au) within one month of the completion of the project. The final report will be tabled at the Foundation meeting of the same year.
- e) On completion date of the project any unspent funds must be returned to the Foundation.
- f) Applicants are expected to include reference to the funding support received from the Australian Lions Foundation as part of any media release.
- g) Recipients of a grant must submit an article (no more than one page) for publication in the Northern District or Australian Lions Newsletter.
