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

Explore the region

North of Townsville is the Paluma Range National Park with Crystal Creek and to the south lies Airlie Beach, the gateway to the Whistsunday Islands and the world-famous Whitehaven Beach. Between Cairns and Townsville lies the ruggedly beautiful Hinchinbrook Island National Park. Just west of Cairns lies the agriculturally rich Atherton Tablelands and to the northwest the Gulf Savannah region with its fringing mountain ranges and wide-open spaces. Cape York Peninsula occupies Queensland's most northern corner and has enormous environmental diversity of great interest to scientists and visitors alike. Further north are the beautiful Torres Strait Islands, which have a unique history and fascinating Indigenous culture.



A region buzzing with arts and culture



JCU Cairns Campus



Along this palm tree lined stretch are bike and walkway paths, safe swimming beaches, picturesque picnic spots, playgrounds, exercise stations, a water park and restaurants and bars with water views. Townsville offers an eclectic mix of cafes, restaurants, boutiques and bars, as well as fresh food markets.


Outdoor adventures

There are many stunning beaches within a short journey from the JCU campus. Grab a snorkel and explore the kaleidoscopic colours of the Great Barrier Reef or jump on a ferry and visit nearby Magnetic Island.

Castle Hill - a giant pink granite monolith - stands proud in the centre of Townsville and offers walking tracks which are frequented by more than 2,500 locals a day! The 360-degree views of Townsville at the top are well worth the journey.







JCU Townsville is set in a 386-hectare bush and parkland setting, approximately a 20-minute drive or 45-minute bus ride from the city centre. Study facilities can also be accessed at the JCU Townsville City campus.

JCU Townsville Campus

The campus is located in the Townsville Tropical Intelligence and Health Precinct in the suburb of Douglas, and set in a 386-hectare natural bush and parkland setting 13 kilometres (8 miles) from Townsville city centre.

Getting around

The JCU campus is a 20-minute drive or 45-minute bus trip from the city. Buses frequently run to and from the campus.

You can even buy a second-hand bike, available from the JCU bicycle store. Study facilities can also be accessed at the JCU Townsville City campus.

Campus facilities

JCU Townsville houses teaching and research facilities, the main JCU library, cafés, bar, fitness and sporting facilities, a Multifaith Chaplaincy Centre. Around 1,200 students live on campus in colleges and halls of residence, giving the campus a true community atmosphere.

Places of worship

JCU's Multifaith Chaplaincy Centre is available as a free facility for you to practice your faith.

Medical

JCU students have access to a range of on-campus services including dental, medical, psychological, physiotherapy, occupational therapy, speech pathology and exercise physiology clinics. Nearby healthcare services include the Townsville University Hospital, located adjacent to the JCU campus providing 24 hour acute care.

On-campus sport

JCU Townsville has excellent sporting facilities on campus plus plenty of clubs for participating and making friends.

Pre-departure planning

Being organised and understanding what you need to do before you travel to Australia will help set you up for success and ensure your journey and arrival is stress-free.



Visas

Most international students require a Subclass 500 Student Visa to study in Australia. Some other Australian visa holders are also eligible to study as international students in Australia.

Processing times vary, therefore it is essential that you allow enough time for visa processing between lodging your application and the start of your academic program at JCU. You will need to provide your confirmation of enrolment (CoE) to apply for your visa.

Travel

Make sure you arrive on time in Cairns or Townsville key International Orientation Welcome event & International Student Orientation— key part of JCU's Orientation Program for all new students. We'll share the exact date in your pre-departure materials, and you can find more details via the link below.

Plan to arrive at least two days before the International Orientation Welcome event to settle in, and adjust to any jet lag. We highly recommend joining the broader Orientation events too. They're essential to a confident start at JCU, and will connect you with your course cohort, JCU's services and facilities, and other students from Australia and around the world.

Off-campus accommodation

Off-campus accommodation is suitable for students who are more familiar with living away from home and who are looking for a more independent lifestyle.

If you are planning to arrange off-campus accommodation when you arrive in Cairns or Townsville, we recommend you arrive at least one week prior to JCU Orientation to allow sufficient time to view and apply for properties and make necessary arrangements including signing a lease. You will need to arrange short-term accommodation in the meantime.

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Setting up a bank account

Australia offers a range of choices when it comes to banking, from banks that cover the whole country, to local credit unions and building societies.

International students can choose to open an account with any bank in Australia. Before setting up a bank account, we recommend that you research the services and fees provided by the major banks. Make sure to check if your bank of choice offers a student account, as these often include special inclusions especially for students.

Cost of living

Understanding and budgeting for your expenses is a very important part of your financial preparation when planning to study as an international student.

We recommend you undertake your own research to develop an understanding of how much you will need to budget for your living expenses whilst in Australia, as cost of living can be highly variable depending on your lifestyle and choice of accommodation.

Townsville and Cairns are regional cities, which generally have a more affordable cost of living when compared to large cities. The information is based on 2023 costs and is provided as an estimate only.

- Groceries / meals: \$140 to \$280 per week
- Gas, electricity: \$10 to \$20 per week
- Phone and Internet: \$15 to \$30 per week
- Public transport: \$40 to \$160 per week
- Car running costs: \$150 to \$260 per week
- Entertainment: \$80 to \$150 per week
- On-campus accommodation: \$194 to \$507 per week
- Off-campus accommodation: \$160 to \$440 per week
- Homestay: \$220 \$360 per week

How much money to bring

Australia's national currency is Australian dollars (AUD) which comes in denominations of \$5, \$10, \$20, \$50 and \$100 notes. Coins come in 5, 10, 20 and 50 cent and one and two dollar denominations.

Only Australian currency can be used in Australia. You can change money at any bank or at currency exchanges in Cairns and Townsville.

Make sure you have sufficient funds to support you when you first arrive. We recommend you have approximately AUD\$1,500 to AU\$2,000 available for the first two to three weeks to pay for temporary accommodation and transport.

If you are renting off-campus, make sure you bring enough cash to cover your bond (equivalent of four weeks rent) as well as purchasing furniture and appliances.

Working while in Australia

Many international students seek part-time or casual work while studying to contribute towards living expenses.

A casual or part-time job can also be a great way to meet people, develop experience and networks, and improve your English.

Australia has a strong system of laws and regulations which protect the rights of all workers - including international students who work.

If you plan to work to help pay for your living expenses whilst in Australia, please understand it may take several months to secure part-time or casual work after you arrive. It's essential that you ensure you have enough funds to cover your expenses.

Bringing your family

Depending on your visa status, you may be able to bring family members to Australia with you. You will be required to include details of any family members you intend to travel with you as part of your visa application, and will be required to demonstrate how your family will be supported financially.

Please be aware that you will need to cover all additional costs involved in bringing your family with you to Australia, which will include airfares, accommodation, Overseas Student Health Cover for all family members, and all living expenses including education costs for children.

You should also consider the social and emotional needs of your family members. Many international students find it useful to travel to Australia individually before arranging for family to join them at a later date.

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Weather

North Queensland is home to some of the best weather that Australia has to offer with lots of sunny days and cool ocean breezes.

The North Queensland climate is characterised by two distinct seasons. Winter is more commonly known as the 'dry' season and runs from May to October with low humidity, refreshing breezes and plenty of sunshine. Conversely, summer is known as the 'wet' season and experiences tropical rain between November to April.

Average maximum temperatures in summer are around 31 degrees Celsius/88 degrees Fahrenheit. In winter, average maximum temperatures are around 25 degrees Celsius/77 degrees Fahrenheit.

Wellbeing

Moving away from your home and support network takes courage and can come with some challenges. When you first arrive in Australia, you will probably feel a mixture of excitement and overwhelm. This is very normal. Being prepared for these feelings and having some coping mechanisms in place can help.

Here are some tips that can help you look after your wellbeing during your first days and weeks in Australia.

• Plan to make the unfamiliar, familiar. Expect lots of things to be different: your room, the people you live with, the weather, the food, the wildlife. Having some familiar things around you can make you feel more comfortable and less overwhelmed. Many students bring simple reminders of home with them, and these can be very comforting. Some ideas include a favourite pillow case or coffee mug, photos of loved ones, or familiar shampoo or body products.

- Access JCU services and ask for help if you need it. The JCU Student Equity and Wellbeing Service provides a range of support services and

- Attend events and connect with others. Our team arrange a variety of events and activities for international students during the first days and weeks of semester. We encourage you to participate in these as they are great way to make friends, have fun, and learn about the wide variety of support services available. 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Your journey to Australia

Baggage

Please ensure you check baggage limits with the airlines you're travelling with, as these can vary. International flights usually allow between 32-35kg of baggage, while Australian domestic flights may only allow 20-23kg of baggage. You don't want to get stuck with a large excess baggage fee, so check before you depart.

Make sure you have an electronic copy and photocopy of your flight tickets, passport and other important documents or valuables in your carry-on luggage.

Australian customs

Australia has strict customs and biosecurity laws with tough penalties for travellers who fail to truthfully declare high risk biosecurity goods when they arrive in Australia.

Visit the Australian Border Force website linked below to understand what you cannot bring into Australia, as well as what items you must declare upon your arrival in Australia

There are rubbish bins available in the airport terminal for you to dispose of any unwanted items before you pass through customs.

You will be asked to complete a Customs Declaration Form prior to entering Australia. This is a legal document and heavy fines can occur if you provide false or misleading information.

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After you arrive

Jet lag

Jet lag occurs when your sleep rhythms are disturbed after long flights through via multiple time zones. It can affect everybody and can be worse the more time zones you travel through, especially if you travel east

Jet lag can cause you to feel tired during the day and find it hard to sleep at night. Other common symptoms include irritability, difficulty concentrating, not being as alert as normal, and feeling low. The symptoms will gradually get better as your body adjusts to the new time zone. Be prepared for these symptoms and, be gentle on yourself and take it easy for the first few days after arrival.

Banking

You can also open an account after you arrive in Australia. Local banks sometimes attend our International Student Orientation events, with staff who can talk you through accounts options and help you with setting up an account. Or you can visit a branch in Cairns or Townsville.

A range of phone and internet services are available in Australia, including fixed (landline) phones, mobile and internet.

We recommend you purchase a SIM card or Australian mobile number when you arrive in Australia, as using your home phone number will incur high costs. You can choose a prepaid service or a contract via numerous mobile phone providers.

Many internet providers in Australia are also mobile carriers and offer pre-paid or contract internet plans. Ask the providers for details of plans that might suit you.

To make international telephone calls from Australia, dial 0011 followed by the country code, the area code (if required) and the telephone number. To call Australia from overseas, dial 61 followed by the area code and telephone number. The circles represent the importance of yarning circles, meeting circles, and communities, in order that we can connect with each other.
