Enhance Your Graduate Employability


In an increasingly competitive labour market it is vital that you possess the skills, attributes, discipline knowledge and related expertise sought by graduate employers.

To enable students to gain a competitive edge, employability-related activities and initiatives are embedded within, and alongside the JCU Bachelor of Business degree using PebblePad as a key tool. Students collect skills-based evidence commencing in first year, culminating in their capstone WIL experience which involves the development of a CV ePortfolio for assessment. Actively engage in these opportunities to increase your chances of graduate success.

JCU Work Integrated Learning Experience

The JCU Bachelor of Business includes a core final year **Work Integrated Learning (WIL)**

experience. Through either an internship, group industry project or work-based project, you can put theory into practice as part of your degree to reinforce your academic learning while developing essential employability skills.

To prepare for this experience, Bachelor of Business students undertake WIL preparation from their first year using the <u>JCU Career Development Program</u>. Students complete prescribed online career development modules and quizzes in each year of their degree to be eligible to apply for their WIL experience in final year.

Professional Development Certificate

All JCU Bachelor of Business students, across all Campuses, have the opportunity to complete the **Professional Development Certificate (PDC).**

The **PDC** involves the voluntary completion of a sequence of non-accredited extra-curricular activities such as volunteering, attending networking events and developing a LinkedIn profile.

Activities are completed in each year of the degree and are designed to enhance the skills and competencies highly valued by prospective employers, improving your graduate employability.

Every student enrolled in the Bachelor of Business has access to a WIL in BBus organization on LearnJCU. More information on WIL and the PDC is available via this site.

Additional Experience

Vacation programs can often lead to graduate employment with the employer. These programs generally take place during student vacations and are often paid. If eligible for WIL, you may be able to do this as an

internship for your core WIL experience.

Cadetships or employment are also available with the option of working part or full time while completing your university studies.

Graduate Programs

Graduate programs are paid structured professional development positions offered by large organisations (e.g. KPMG, PwC. Accenture) or government departments. Successful applicants are offered on the job training and mentoring.

The organisations' generally recruit students throughout their final year of study for commencement in the following year. Applications open as early as March.

Graduate programs are competitive, so it is important to understand what is expected and work towards ensuring you have the skills, knowledge and experience required.

Starting a Business

The Queensland Government Starting a Business site provides information and advice on how to set up your own business or start up in Queensland. Information includes: planning a business, costs, finance and banking, business types and legal structures, licensing, registrations, legal obligations, IT requirements etc.
