Stand Out - Enhance Your Graduate Employability

In an increasingly competitive labour market it is vital that you build the relevant experience demonstrating your initiative, creativity, adaptability, entrepreneurial spirit and ability to identify and solve problems.

Start scoping out and planning your skill development opportunities from the first semester of your studies.

Join a JCU Student Club e.g. [JCU Business Society Townsville](#) and help with project and event management as well as with club leadership roles.

Participate in the JCU [Student Mentor Program](#) as a mentee and later as a mentor. Develop communication skills including building rapport, the ability to receive and give advice, explain concepts and procedures in a simple language; skills essential in many consulting settings and leadership or supervisory roles.

A great way to show initiative, leadership and interdisciplinary collaboration skills and apply your

course knowledge in solving real life industry challenges is participating in a [student competition](#). Most of them are only organised once a year, so we recommend that you pencil the competitions of interest in your calendar and start building a team.

Another way to develop professional networks while applying course knowledge and gaining insights about various industries is part time work and [volunteering at JCU](#) or within the [wider community](#). Employers recruiting for vacation programs and internships will be highly impressed to hear [what skills you had developed](#).

JCU Work Integrated Learning Experience

The JCU Bachelor of Business includes a core final year [Work Integrated Learning \(WIL\)](#) experience. Through either an **internship, group industry project or work-based project**, where you can put theory into practice as part of your degree to reinforce your academic learning while developing essential employability skills.

To prepare for this experience, Bachelor of Business students undertake WIL preparation from their first year using the [JCU Career Development Program](#). Students complete prescribed online career development modules and quizzes in each year of their degree to be eligible to apply for their WIL experience.

Professional Development Certificate

All JCU Bachelor of Business students, across all Campuses, have the opportunity to complete the **Professional Development Certificate (PDC)**.

The **PDC** involves the voluntary completion of a sequence of non-accredited extra-curricular activities such as volunteering, attending

networking events and developing a LinkedIn profile.

Activities are completed in each year of the degree and are designed to enhance the skills and competencies highly valued by prospective employers, and the evidence is collected using [PebblePad](#).

Student membership with a Professional Association or Industry Body is one of the activities within the PDC and is an ideal way to gain valuable insight into your future profession, develop skills, demonstrate interest and meet people in your field who can support you in developing your career.

Additional Experience

Vacation programs can often lead to graduate employment with the employer. These programs generally take place during vacations and are often paid. If eligible for WIL, you may be able to do this as an internship for your core WIL experience.

Cadetships or employment are also available with the option of working while completing your studies.

Graduate Programs

Graduate programs are paid structured professional development positions offered by large organisations (e.g. KPMG, PwC, Accenture) or government departments. Participants are offered on the job training and mentoring.

The organisations' generally **recruit students throughout their final year of study** for commencement in the following year. Applications open as early as March.

Graduate programs are competitive, so it is important to understand what is expected and work towards ensuring you have the skills, knowledge and experience required.
