30 new Australia Awards Scholarship students from eight countries commenced their studies at JCU in February 2015 with the vast majority undertaking postgraduate studies in Public Health and Science.

The four-week full-time Introductory Academic Program included intensive academic and cultural orientation but also made time for social outings to Billabong Sanctuary (Australian wildlife sanctuary), Reef HQ Aquarium and the Cultural Centre to learn about Australia's Indigenous culture.

Attending the IAP full-time for four weeks paved the way for the awardees to get to know one another and form lifelong friendships. Many have since been joined by their families from home and are progressing well into their studies at JCU.

AAS at JCU: Facts and Figures

James Cook University has been supporting students under Australia Award Scholarships (and its previous equivalents) since the mid-1990's. There are currently 138 awardees representing 34 countries studying at JCU with 80% on the Townsville campus and 20% on the Cairns campus. The largest cohort comes from Papua New Guinea making up 28.5% of the AAS student population followed by the awardees from Indonesia representing 21% of the student cohort.

15% of the AAS Awardees are completing an undergraduate program, 55% postgraduate programs and 30% higher degree research programs (Master of Philosophy and Doctor of Philosophy).

The JCU 2014 Australia Awards Scholarship Annual Report shows that 92% of the student group have achieved satisfactory academic progress during the same year.

Hungry at JCU? We have you covered...



Eating on-campus has come a long way. These days a range of options have opened up providing students with a smorgasbord of delights.

The JCU Refectory is still the main student eating hub providing hot and cold meals such as sandwiches, salads, fish and chips, burgers and a juice and smoothie bar. Add to this barista-style coffee bar and the dining experience is complete. The JCU Student Association also runs The Club where patrons can order food off the menu while enjoying a beverage and sit outdoors in the garden area.

The Green Plate Café serves salads, light lunches and coffee. Their outdoor deck is popular with students and staff and is a great spot from which to watch birds and other wildlife.

There are three privately operated food outlets on campus. Located on the ground floor of the JCU Library, Juliette's is the go-to for an ice cream or coffee fix. The café also serves cakes and other sweet and savoury delights.

Taking it to the top

The canopy is the business end of the rainforest, and the 47-metre canopy crane at James Cook University's Daintree Rainforest Observatory (DRO) takes researchers right to the top.

Working from a gondola suspended from the crane's 57-metre arm, scientists can work in and above the rainforest canopy of a hectare of rainforest, as well as accessing data about forest function via a network of 500 sensors that measure microclimates, tree growth and sap flow.

While the crane has been operating since the late 1990s, the Commonwealth Government's Education Innovation Fund provided \$9.37M to acquire the formerly leased site and add facilities that make it a globally significant field centre for rainforest research.

The DRO was officially opened by the Federal Member for Leichhardt, the Hon Warren Entsch, and JCU Vice Chancellor Professor Sandra Harding.

"This is one of the very few sites in the world where students and researchers can get access all the way through a rainforest, from soil to atmosphere," Professor Andrew Krockenberger, JCU's Dean of Research said.

The Observatory is connected to international networks of research stations, including the International Long Term Ecological Research Network, and the Royal Society's South-East Asia Rainforest Research program.

"Long-term research here has an important part to play in understanding global ecosystems and developing solutions to current and future environmental and community problems," Professor Krockenberger said.

As part of the new development we are also providing more information and facilities that will help teachers around the world bring rainforest studies to their classes.

Professor Robyn McGuiggan, Deputy Vice Chancellor and Head of JCU's Cairns campus, said the new facility would attract more research and attention to the already world-famous rainforests of the Wet Tropics.

"Thanks to the support of the Department of Education, we are now able to accommodate



up to 46 researchers and students in shared accommodation close to research sites.

"We believe it will contribute to the ongoing growth of nature-based tourism in the Daintree by attracting researchers, students, and media attention from around the world. Research and teaching laboratories onsite will enable JCU to teach rainforest science in one of the world's most spectacular lowland rainforest research locations."
