## **Snake Season**

Snakes become more active from their mating season in September and into the warmer months. With snakes becoming more active, it is likely that occasionally a snake will cross paths with a human.





#### **Facts**

- A snake bite will result from a snake being frightened, surprised or cornered;
- Some snakes are naturally docile, some naturally agitated and all will defend themselves if escape is not possible;
- Australian snakes can differ in colour leading to misidentification;
- Chemical analysis of the venom around the bite site is used for identification;
- Australian snake venom does not enter the blood stream first. It enters the lymphatic stream, then works its way through the lymphatic system into the blood;
- You can speed the process up by moving around or slow it down by staying still.

## Do's Don'ts

 Contact a local Snake Catcher if required (check the yellow pages) or if on campus contact Security (contact details below).

## When working outdoors ensure you:

- Stay on the paths or tracks that you can see:
- Carry a first aid kit that contains the appropriate bandages;
- Wear protective clothing such as covered shoes and trousers;
- Carry a torch at night so you can see where you are going.

- Don't attempt to capture or injure a snake (this will put you at a higher risk of being bitten);
- Don't leave food scraps out (rats and birds attract snakes);
- Don't leave building equipment in a mess e.g. piles of timber can create warm shelters for snakes if not stacked properly;
- Do not put hands or feet in or under logs or rocks without checking that there is no snake there first;
- Don't panic!

### What to do if bitten

- Do not panic, it is unlikely the bite will be life-threatening;
- Call 000 for an ambulance;
- Use the <u>pressure-immobilisation technique</u>, and have the patient taken immediately to the emergency department of the nearest hospital.
